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Accurate health data for precise breeding value estimation

Every livestock farmer aims to have healthy cows, and this is essential for fully realizing a herd's productive potential. To achieve this, nothing beats close observation and the excellent care provided by our farm manager families.

However, there are also clearly genetic factors that influence the health of our animals. As a Bruna Data farm, we not only have a duty to accurately record health data, but we also benefit significantly from the discounts on animal genotyping.

Office work is anything but my favorite thing to do. But the health portal on BrunaNet or the SmartCow app – which will be replaced by SmartHerd this summer – makes the process much easier.

It's even easier for businesses that work with a veterinarian who uses the Diana veterinary practice software. Starting this winter, it has been possible to have treatment or Health data is transmitted to Braunvieh Schweiz via this software. They are imported directly into the farms' treatment logs.

Qualitas relies on the most accurate and complete collection of health data possible so that breeding values for health traits such as resistance to mastitis and ketosis, etc., can be estimated. In short, the more accurate and complete the data collection is, the more reliable the estimated breeding values will be.

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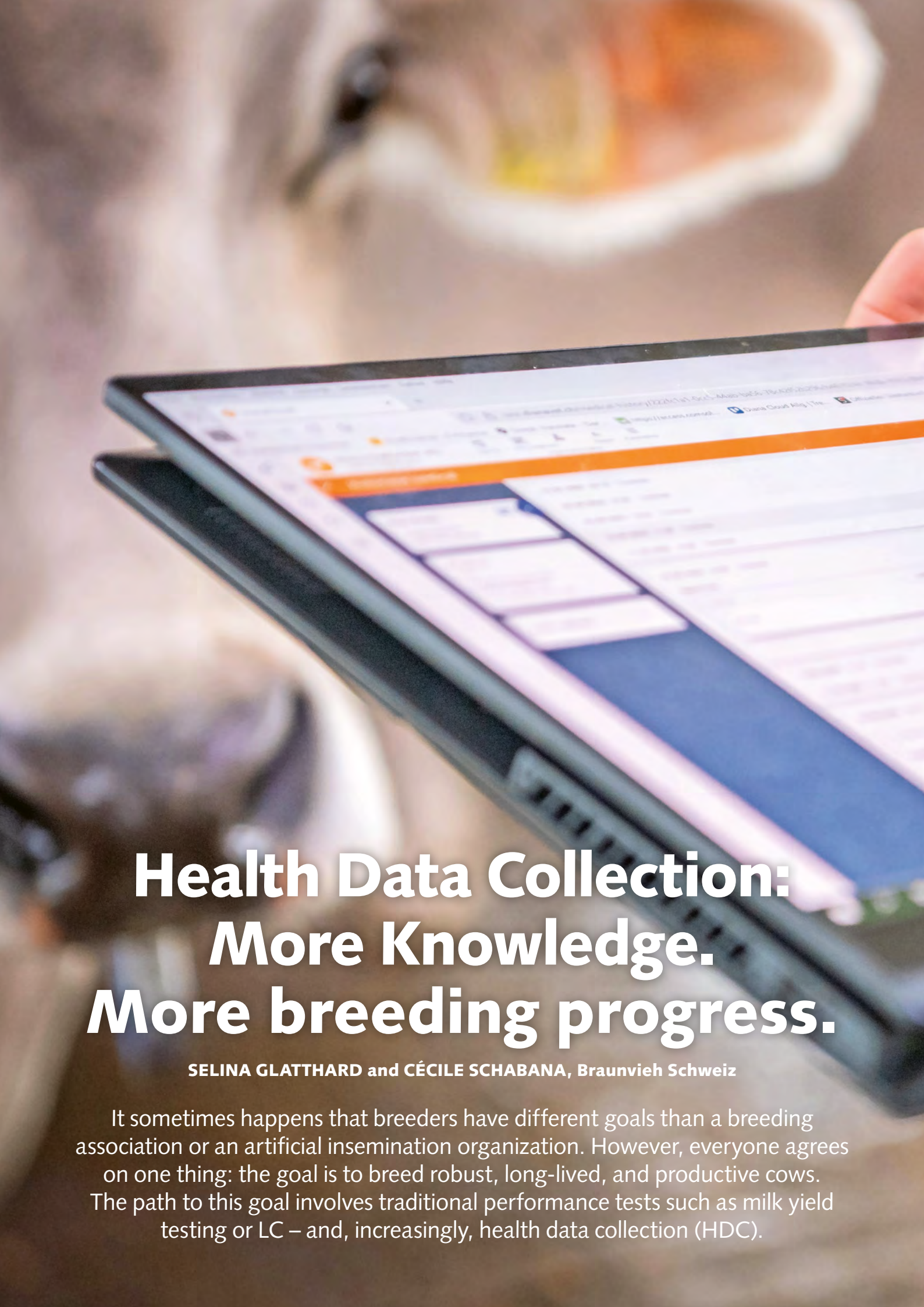

It sometimes happens that breeders have different goals than a breeding association or an artificial insemination organization. However, everyone agrees on one thing: the goal is to breed robust, long-lived, and productive cows. The path to this goal involves traditional performance tests such as milk yield testing or LC – and, increasingly, health data collection (HDC).

By systematically recording disease diagnoses, treatments, and other health-related events, breeding is specifically focused on functional traits such as fertility and animal health. This not only helps to further develop one's own herd and breeding program, but also strengthens the competitiveness of Swiss genetics.

Breeding values based on health data

Breeding values for resistance to mastitis and ketosis are already available today, based in part on health data. As the volume of data increases, its accuracy is continuously improving. Hoof breeding values have also been added. This is largely based on data collected through the "Healthy Hooves" resource project with the help of around 100 hoof care specialists. In total, there are currently around 65 000 data records available for the claws. About 33 000, or roughly half, were allocated to the breeding value estimation.

This example clearly shows that a large volume of data – and, above all, complete data collection – is crucial for meaningful results.

Completeness determines the validity of the data

A key aspect of health data collection is its completeness. It is not just a matter of which animals were sick. Information about healthy animals is just as important. Taking the example of hoof breeding values again, the fact is that farms generally do not actively record data on healthy cows. Thanks to data collected by hoof trimmers, it was also possible to identify the healthy animals.

Only complete data at the operational level can therefore provide reliable analyses. At the same time, it becomes clear that collecting health data is a collaborative effort: it takes time, a large amount of data, and communication with partners such as hoof trimmers and veterinarians.

Discussions with veterinarians

An important step in this direction is the ability, introduced this winter, to transmit diagnoses and treatments directly from the veterinarian to the treatment journal in BrunaNet. This significantly reduces the workload for businesses and further improves data quality. The following pages explain how this works, what the challenges are, and where this path leads.

Health Portal on BrunaNet

However, even without a direct connection to the veterinarian, the ability to independently record health data offers significant value to the farm. This is where the BrunaNet health portal comes in, which has been available for some time now. Nevertheless, many users are not yet fully aware of the wide range of possibilities. Recording treatment logs via BrunaNet or the SmartCow app – and its successor, SmartHerd – offers clear advantages.

Easy to read and always within reach

The treatment record can be easily entered at any time. With just a few clicks, treatments are documented and can then be easily accessed. All entries are digitally archived and are available at any time as needed, or can be printed out regularly.

Intuitive operation

The interface is deliberately designed to be intuitive: medications can be quickly found using an integrated database, and withdrawal periods are automatically stored, eliminating the need to calculate them manually. Favorites make it particularly easy to record recurring treatments. This makes keeping the treatment log a routine task without requiring much extra effort.

A Brief History of Animal Health

Another advantage is evident at a glance: In BrunaNet, each animal has its own health record, which consolidates information from milk yield testing and the treatment log. This makes an animal's health history clear at a glance and can provide valuable guidance for breeding decisions.

Connected for Animal Health: How Data Flows Between Systems

To enable the exchange of health data between different systems, e.g., Veterinary practice software, the Information System on Antibiotics in Veterinary Medicine (IS ABV), the electronic treatment journal in BrunaNet (ETJ), and milking machines – in order for data to be exchanged between these systems, it must be clearly structured. This means, for example, that diseases must be recorded using a diagnostic code that all system participants have agreed upon. Or that the medications administered and the animals treated can be clearly identified.

When exchanging data digitally, it is also important that participants can log in securely and that there are clear rules regarding who is authorized to send and receive which data.

Requirements and one-time setup steps

It is currently possible to send treatment records from the DianaCloud veterinary practice software.

Veterinarian:

- Use Diana with the DianaCloud extension
- Apply for a login with the breeding associations
- Configure the necessary settings (guided by Diana Software AG)

Operation:

- Then add the veterinarian to BrunaNet under "My Account" in "My Advisors," thereby granting permission for data to be transferred to the treatment journal. Alternatively, he can contact Braunvieh Schweiz directly.

Ongoing operations

Once everything is set up, the veterinarian will record the treatment in DianaCloud, just as before. When saving, the user is automatically asked whether the treatment should be sent to the company's EBJ. Just like when prescribing to IS ABV, the

veterinarian can now send the treatment with just a few clicks. A few moments later, the treatment will be visible in the ETJ of the facility in BrunaNet.

If an antibiotic that must be reported to IS ABV is used during treatment, the report to IS ABV and the submission to the ETJ on behalf of the veterinarian are handled in a single step, so no additional effort is required.

Challenges and Outlook

Developing an interface for data exchange is time-consuming and expensive. In addition to planning and financing, cooperation and the capacities of the various system participants are particularly crucial.

Not all of the planned interfaces can be implemented at the same time.

That is why the breeding organizations have decided to start by using the DianaCloud veterinary practice software for the exchange of health data. The goal is for other software providers to have this option in the future as well.

The exchange of health data with milking machine manufacturers has also been in the works for some time. In addition to milk production data, the first steps will involve implementing the transmission of insemination/Fertalys data and MR data before moving on to health data. This is especially true since some manufacturers do not yet use a diagnostic key. ■

This significantly improves data quality. At the same time, there is no longer a need to keep a handwritten treatment log on paper or maintain separate inventory lists. Data is exchanged only with the farm's consent and after the necessary activation has taken place.

Veterinarians and farmers benefit

The data collected by the veterinarian plays an important role in breeding more robust cows and improving the farm's

profitability. At the same time, breeders can keep track of treatments and medications administered. Both the farm and the veterinarian benefit from this thanks to a smooth flow of information in their daily practice and farm operations. ■

Automatic Health Data Transmission Put to the Test

SILVRETTA VETERINARIANS, Inc., Klosters-Serneus

As a pioneer in the field, Silvretta Tierärzte AG was an early adopter of automated transmission of treatment data. The people in charge explain why this step was worthwhile, what challenges they faced, and how both the team and customers are benefiting from the new system.

What is the process from treating an animal on the farm to transferring the treatment data to the treatment log in BrunaNet?

Silvretta Tierärzte AG: After treating an animal, we veterinarians dictate the details of the procedure to the veterinary practice assistants (VPAs) via WhatsApp: the owner's name, the animal's name, the date, the reason for the treatment, the findings, the diagnosis, the procedures performed, and all medications administered along with their dosages. After that, the TPA enters all the data into our practice management software, "Diana." In a second step, the data is forwarded to the breeding association and the IS-ABV reporting office. For all previously recorded medications – not just antibiotics – the method of administration, the number of doses per day, the dosage, and the duration of treatment must be entered again in the Diana Cloud.

How would you compare the time required by the previous data entry system to that of the current system, which automatically transmits data to Braunvieh Schweiz?

The workload has increased for us. However, a major advantage is that the new system, with its interfaces to the TVD and BrunaNet, automatically generates the animal lists. The assignment to the treated animal is also correct in each case. With a single click, the recorded data is automatically reported to BrunaNet and the legally mandated reporting agency for antibiotic use, IS ABV.

Overall, however, the time required for our TPAs has increased. This is because, unlike in the past, all medications – not just antibiotics – are now being prescribed.

What feedback have you received from the participating farmers regarding the import of data into the treatment log?

Most farmers, understandably, prefer to keep administrative burdens to a minimum and therefore greatly appreciate the automatic transmission of data to BrunaNet and the seamless maintenance of the treatment log that comes with it.

What kind of feedback did you receive from your own team?

The system is now well established and offers participating veterinarians significant advantages, particularly in terms of being able to instantly (within seconds) access an individual animal's medical history on their mobile phone – for example, while they are in the barn. Everyone on the team really appreciates this.

What motivated you to participate as a pilot veterinarian and implement the new system?

The motivation was, on the one hand, to contribute to innovative solutions and, on the other hand, to generate added value for customers without incurring additional costs.

What has been your experience so far during the pilot phase as a pilot veterinarian? And what has your experience been like in day-to-day operations?

With a pilot project, you never really know exactly what to expect. And that's probably for the best. It took a great deal of patience on the part of our TPAs, especially in the early stages. However, the support provided by the software specialists at Diana was excellent.

Do you have any recommendations or comments you would like to share with farmers, the breeding organization, or other veterinarians?

For all new digital solutions, the primary goal must be to reduce administrative burdens or to be able to cut down on "paperwork." With the HDC via farm management software, this has at least been achieved for farmers. ■

What is the IS ABV?

The IS ABV is a federal information system in which veterinarians are required to record antibiotic prescriptions for animals in order to monitor consumption in Switzerland. The collected data makes it possible to analyze the use of antibiotics, compare farms, and develop targeted measures to combat antibiotic resistance.



A breakthrough in health data collection

Consistent performance despite adjustments

In the April breeding value prediction, the base is adjusted. On the other hand, this is an opportunity to introduce new breeding values or adjust existing ones.

In April 2026, the base adjustment was +15 kg for milk, +0.01 % each for fat and protein, and 2 points for the udder. The overall breeding index and the milk value for BS were also introduced using the new weights. Breeding values for mastitis resistancy are now predicted using the single-step method.

A new pipeline has been created for the calving traits. This means that, in addition to the switch to single-step breeding

value estimation, there will be significant changes to the breeding values for "calving ease direct" and "calving ease maternal." A different data set will now be used, and the system will be switched from the sire model to an animal model. This means that the mother's influence is directly taken into account in the breeding value estimation.

The genetic defects BH39, BH40, SPATA16, QRICH2, and WDR19 have

also been published. The last three are recorded only for male animals (see Herd Book Regulations).

"Optimal" remains the gold standard

With an additional 275 subsidiaries, Optimal is delivering on its promises. Even the switch to the single-step method for mastitis resistancy has little effect on its high breeding value. With a milk yield

of +1079 kg, a somatic cell count of 123, a mastitis resistancy score of 109, and a fertility score of 125, he remains the top-ranked proven AI bull based on TMI. His breeding value for performance improvement also underscores the high performance potential of Optimal's daughters, with a breeding value of 108. SYR Aristo Arif also remains in second place with a TMI of 1372. His excellent performance traits continue to be a strong point. With 92 additional daughters, he can increase his protein content to 0.22 %. His daughters also excel in functional traits such as cell count (113), mastitis resistancy (109), and fertility (104).

A newcomer rounds out the podium. Scherma Noro Guy confirms his high genomic scores and enters the rankings in third place with a score of 1366. With a milk yield of 852 kg, a positive protein content, and excellent physical condition, he meets all the requirements of an outstanding progeny-tested bull. With 249 daughters, he already has a solid data set thanks to his extensive use as a young sire. With a cell count of 119, a mastitis resistancy score of 113, and a fertility score of 112, he has excellent health scores. Schwegler's BS Brice Benji is also ranked for the second round. One of the few Brice sons is making his debut with outstanding milk yield potential of +1231 kg. This ET-free bull impresses with its excellent genetic potential and fertility, as well

as its outstanding conformation. When selecting breeding pairs, attention must be paid to the inheritance of somatic cell count and mastitis resistancy.

Original Braunvieh:

Minor changes / two new bulls

With 238 additional daughters, Omar continues to improve his milk yield to +577 kg. It lives up to the slogan "Milk and Meat." With an IFV of 126, he rounds out his strong performance. Killy, Orlando, and Donald continue to hold the spots right behind them.

Everyone was eagerly awaiting Rasimus's first results. The son of Rugel and the 2024 Sorexpo runner-up, Harley Humana, has sired several outstanding daughters that have been shown at various shows. Its product, which impresses with its appearance, fitness features, and milk contents, is further enhanced by a positive IFV.

As a further addition to the OB program, Menovin was classified as Kappa Casein BB. The Morin son excels in milk yield, health, conformation, and IFV. He inherited his high milk-producing potential from his dam, Gorner Goldi. Goldi produced an average of 10120 kg of milk over 5 lactations.

Outlook for April 2027

The final two major changes are expected next year. The breeding value estimates for longevity and fertility are expected to

be converted to the single-step method. Work is currently underway to adjust the model for both breeding value estimates. Fertility, in particular, is an important trait for Brown Swiss cattle breeders. As the work progresses, a potential new trait – age at first insemination – will also be analyzed. The fertility index and the respective weighting of the individual traits will also be examined in greater detail as this work progresses, and possible adjustments are currently being evaluated. A new model for the breeding value for longevity is currently being developed, which takes into account the various stages of a dairy cow's life. Determining the weighting of individual life spans in the final breeding value is also part of the ongoing work ahead of the planned introduction of the new single-step breeding value in April 2027. ■

Scherma Noro GUY – CH 120.1553.5565.6

Noro × Balzac × Simbaboy



With eight young bulls in the artificial insemination program, Guy was frequently used as a sire. With an outstanding initial performance, he confirms his high genomic breeding values and, based on the first 249 daughters contributing to his progeny performance, ranks as the top bull in the Swiss program. Thus, he is not only an outcross bull with a different blood-line, but also demonstrates that the cow families from the Schertenleib farm are once again worthy of praise.

The dam, Balzac Griotte, is one of the highest-producing Brown Swiss cows, averaging 12 609 kg of milk over three lactations, with 5.58 % fat and 4.04 % protein. Her grandmother, Simbaboy Gretchen, also has an average yield of 11 455 kg, with 4.59 % fat and 3.84 % protein.

But Guy isn't the only bull in this family to make it through the progeny testing. Greg, the son of Eagle born in 2004, is already returning to service with a positive breeding record.

Schwegler's BS Brice BENJI – CH 120.1591.1988.9

Brice × Grischa Star × Genox Boy



With his first daughters, Benji, a son of Brice, is living up to his promise of performance. He enters his re-use with a milk yield of +1231 kg. He doesn't get his performance just from his father. His dam, Grischa Star Bria, has an average milk yield of 11 350 kg and was 17 points above the farm average.

His family of cows is also well known. Jetway Patty, who was the result of an embryo import from Vogue Pammy, was a well-known show cow who also excelled with an average lactation yield of 11 848 kg and a lifetime yield of over 137 000 kg. Patty had already brought a bull into the second round. Over 12 000 births have been registered for Cognac Carlos.

Benji is a very interesting bull in terms of his genetic potential for performance and conformation. When selecting breeding pairs, attention must be paid to fitness traits, particularly resistance to mastitis.

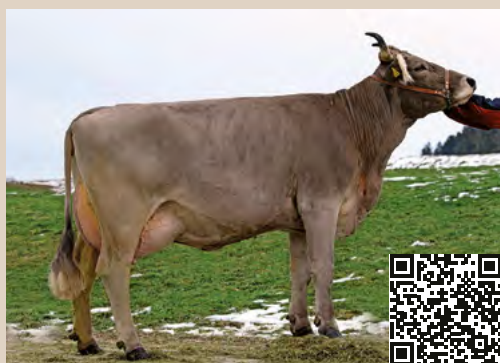

Rasi Breiti's Morin MENOVIN – CH 120.1563.2797.3

Morin × Gorner × Winzer



Menovin combines milk production with good fitness, conformation, and meat quality. It also contains BB kappa-casein, which is suitable for cheese production. He has no known genetic defects, and his maternal lineage features a versatile line of sires.

Gorner Goldi, Menovin's mother, is an exceptionally high-performing cow. She has an average milk yield of 10 120 kg over five lactations, with an average somatic cell count of 34, which is 12 cells per milliliter above the farm average. In addition, the DL cow was rated VG 85 in her first lactation and has already achieved a lifetime yield of over 54 000 kg. Menovin's grandmother, the dairy cow Zarti, was already classified as EX94 and achieved a lifetime milk yield of over 37 000 kg. This is also the case with very low cell counts of 27.

This genetic profile, which is further influenced by his sire Morin, is also reflected in Menovin's genetic makeup. When it comes to performance, the milk yield of +872 kg certainly stands out. When breeding with Menovin, attention must be paid to protein content and milkability. Another notable figure is the positive cell count of 112. His daughters are easygoing cows in everyday life.

Expectations for Rasimus are high. In fact, he had already has 1775 registered female breeding animals. He owes his popularity partly to his excellent genomic breeding values and partly to the fact that he comes from a very deep cow family.

His mother, Harley Humana, has already completed her sixth lactation and has an average milk yield of 9288 kg. Also striking are the extremely low cell counts of just 12 across all lactations. She's no stranger to the show ring either. At Sorexpo 2024, Humana, classified as EX95, won the Reserve Champion title and received an Honorable Mention in the conformation competition.

The DL cow's dam, Magnus Mureli, had already impressed with high milk yields of over 11 000 kg and very low somatic cell counts. Based on an average of four lactations, Mureli, who is rated EX93, has only 60.

Now in its third generation, Vogt Viola continues to impress with the same qualities: high milk yield, good somatic cell counts, and an excellent rating. She is also the grandmother of the current Mister ZM Zug, Wenger Winzer. Rasimus inherited his strong build and high cell count from his ancestors. He also has a positive influence on the IFV.

News from the breeding program

SIMON SCHLEBUSCH, Braunvieh Schweiz

Since publication of estimated breeding values in April the carrier status for the haplotypes BH39 and BH40 are published for Brown Swiss cattle. In homozygous stage, they are associated with rearing losses and infertility. In addition, WDR19, QRICH2, and SPATA16 are now published for male animals. JM1 has been published for Jersey.

The abbreviation BH39 is used for Brown Swiss haplotype 39. A mutation in this haplotype is associated with rearing losses in cattle. Homozygous animals exhibit tooth discoloration, impaired physical development, and are susceptible to disease. Recurrent cases of pneumonia and diarrhea are common. Nesta was the first bull to spread BH39 within the Swiss population.

BH40 is an abbreviation for Brown Swiss Haplotype 40. A mutation in this haplotype is associated with reduced fertility in cattle. Studies show that the problem likely

arises shortly after fertilization, before the first cell division. In addition, some homozygous animals exhibit gait abnormalities of varying severity, including crossing of the hind legs, a stiff gait, or other neuromuscular problems. Jinx King is the oldest known carrier.

The genetic disorders mentioned above are inherited in a recessive manner. This means that an animal is affected only if it inherits the defective gene from both its father and its mother. Braunvieh Schweiz therefore recommends avoiding high-risk matings. This refers to matings in which

both the sire and the mated female are carriers. Genotyping allows us to draw conclusions about all currently known genetic defects. To avoid risky matings, the mating plan in BrunaNet, with its genetic defect light system, is the tool of choice. BH39 and BH40 are now also included.

Haplotypes related to male fertility

WDR19 is a gene in which a mutation can lead to reduced fertility in male animals. Homozygous bulls exhibit reduced repro-

ductive performance. This applies to Brown Swiss and Original Braunvieh. QRICH2 is a gene in which a mutation leads to severely impaired fertility in male animals. The sperm count is significantly reduced, and the sperm are immobile and abnormally shaped. Homozygous bulls are virtually infertile. This applies to Brown Swiss and Original Braunvieh. SPATA16 is a gene mutation that reduces fertility in male animals. It interferes with sperm production and thereby leads to reduced fertility. This applies to Brown Swiss and Original Braunvieh. The following applies to all of the male haplotypes listed above: Since only male fertility is affected, only male carriers are identified. Breeders can view all genetic defects and haplotypes for their genotyped animals under "Herd Lists/Genetic Markers."

New haplotype for milk in Jersey cattle

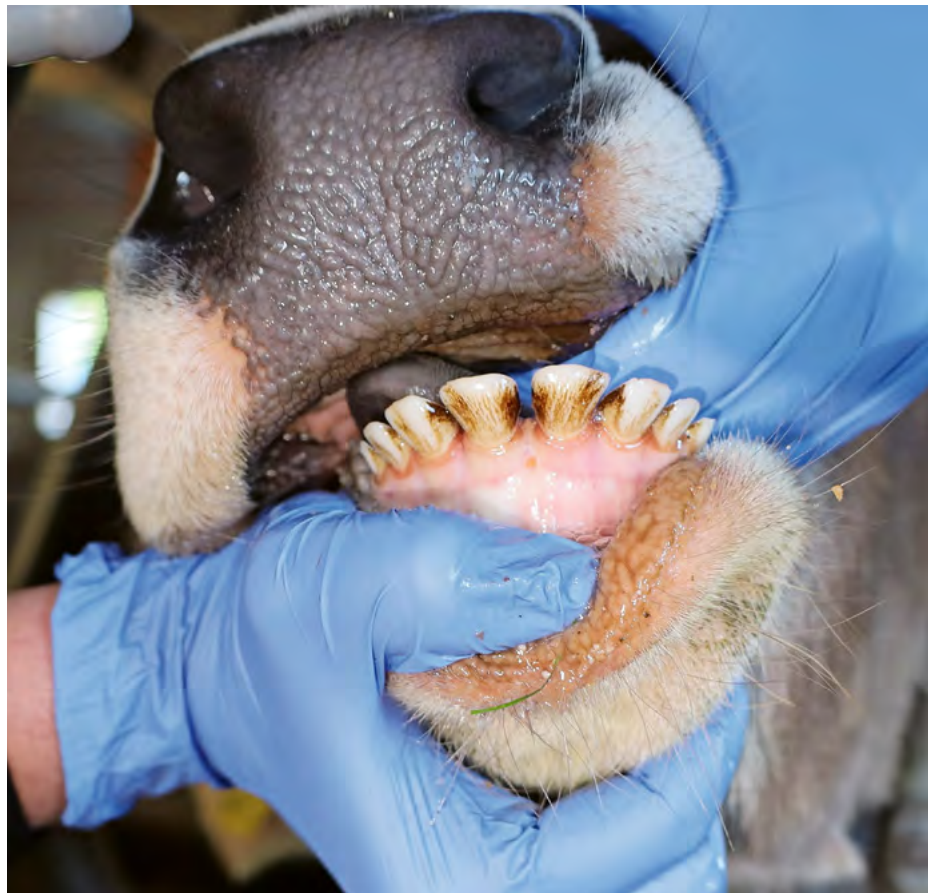
JM1 refers to the Jersey milk haplotype 1. A mutation in this genetic region has a negative effect on milk yield. Affected animals produce less milk. The fat and protein content of the milk is also lower.

New single-step breeding values

With the April breeding value prediction, additional traits will be included that are now estimated using the single-step method rather than the two-step method as was previously the case. Starting in April, the traits "calving ease Bulls & Daughters," "stillbirth Bulls & Daughters," and "Mastitis Resistancy" will benefit from higher reliability. As mentioned elsewhere, the single-step estimation for the traits of fertility and longevity will be postponed by one year.

Why does the reliability increase so significantly?

Reliability has increased, in particular, because significantly more genotypes are now included in breeding value estimation

than in the past: depending on the trait, the number has risen from around 10 000 to over 150 000. This allows breeding values to be estimated much more accurately. This effect is particularly pronounced in young Swiss AI bulls, as they are closely related to the genotyped cow population,

which also provides data from milk performance testing and confirmation scoring. Qualitas AG's analyses also show that breeding values are very stable: less than 1 % of the animals fell outside the confidence interval, mostly due to a large amount of newly added information. ■

Suisselab AG now offers a PCR test for *Staphylococcus aureus* genotype B

Staphylococcus aureus is one of the most common causes of mastitis in dairy cows. *Staphylococcus aureus* is a contagious bacterium associated with the udder and is primarily transmitted via the milking equipment or the milker's hands. It usually leads to chronic subclinical mastitis, which is primarily characterized by intermittent increases in cell counts. Clinical mastitis is less common, but it is sometimes associated with fever and recumbency.

Genotype B is particularly contagious

Not all genotypes of *Staphylococcus aureus* are equally contagious. The so-called genotype B (GTB) has proven to be the most contagious, often leading to herd problems as a result. Due to the risk of infection, extra caution is required, especially when your own animals come into contact with animals from other farms, such as when purchasing new stock, during summer grazing, or at exhibitions. To prevent the introduction or spread of *Staphylococcus aureus*, the animals should first be tested for the pathogen through a milk test.

In cases of chronic subclinical mastitis, *Staphylococcus aureus* is often excreted in only very small amounts or not at all. This makes it difficult to detect the pathogen in the laboratory. To demonstrate freedom from the disease, three samples must therefore test negative in a standard bacteriological examination conducted at intervals of 10–14 days. Detection by PCR is significantly more sensitive than bacteriological testing, especially when preceded by pathogen enrichment.

Easy testing of GTB and non-GTB *Staphylococcus aureus*

Since April 1, 2026, Suisselab AG has been offering a new PCR test for the simultaneous detection of GTB and non-GTB *Staphylococcus aureus*. This ensures that

infections caused by non-GTB *Staphylococcus aureus* can also be detected and their spread prevented. The bacteria from the milk sample are enriched in liquid culture prior to PCR analysis, which makes the method highly sensitive. Due to its high sensitivity, the method is suitable for detection in individual animal samples, pooled samples, and tank milk.

Milk samples for GTB-PCR can be submitted using the MID sampling kits provided free of charge by Suisselab AG. The list price of the analysis is CHF 40.–. As with all MID analyses, members of Braunvieh Schweiz, Holstein Switzerland, and Swissherdbook receive a 5% discount; if they sign up for a health

subscription, the discount is 10%. Until the end of June, Suisselab AG is also offering an introductory discount of CHF 5.– regarding the examination. The MID test reports are sent via email. For members of the breeding association, this information is also stored in the online portals.

Achievements and Events

Their greatest success to date was their participation in the 2015 Young Breeders' Alpine Festival in Cazis, Graubünden, where the Ticino Young Breeders' Group won the Cantonal Cup and the showmanship competition, and also excelled in the cattle competition by taking home the runner-up title and an honorable mention. In 2012 and 2017, the team also finished in second place in the Cantonal Cup, in addition to winning several category titles and achieving strong placings and results in the special competitions.

At this year's Alpin Festival, the Ticino Young Breeders' Group once again achieved excellent results, securing several top placements and two category wins. In December 2019, a young breeders' day was organized, during which experts shared tips on preparing cattle, showmanship, judging, and styling – an event that is set to be held again in the future.

A key focus remains participation in the organizing committee of Giubiespo, the most important Brown Swiss cattle show in Ticino. Two members of the Young Breeders' Committee also serve on that committee. The Giubiespo 2026 took place on Sunday, March 15, and reaffirmed its significance. Despite difficult weather and road conditions, we were able to welcome numerous exhibitors and visitors. Of particular note is the intercantonal young breeders' competition in the morning.

The general meeting was held in January 2026, with 45 members in attendance. In April 2025, about twenty young breeders went on a field trip to Schwyz and Uri. First, they visited Markus Kennel's farm, where he showed them two breeding families. Afterward, the group visited the anniversary show hosted by the Uri-Gothard Breeders' Association. Another excursion is planned for 2026: On April 18, the trip will take us to the

cantons of Lucerne and Uri. The plan is to visit Daniel Küng's farm, followed by a visit to the VZG Entlebuch anniversary exhibition. In the evening, the group will attend the VZG Seedorf anniversary exhibition. On September 28, 2025, the young breeders took part in the Giornata Agricola Leventinese. More than 30 members helped out in the festival tent, the kitchen, and the bar, and played a key role in the event's success.

The Ticino Young Breeders' Association aims to continue supporting the next generation and fostering a love of livestock breeding. ■

Guy's daughters impress

There were high expectations for Scherma Noro Guy's progeny performance test results. He currently has eight sons in progeny testing. Guy has met expectations and is the highest-scoring domestic bull by TMI in the AI catalog.

The bloodline combination of Noro × Balzac × Simbaboy is well suited to our Swiss population. Guy, an outcross bull with strengths in performance, fitness, and conformation, was sent into his second breeding season. Once again, a bull with the Scherma prefix lives up to expectations.

First daughters make a strong impression

Currently, 55 cows are being milked at over 30 kg per day. Some of them even exceeded the 40-kilogram milk yield mark. There were already some wonderful Guy daughters on display in the show ring as well.

However, its main strengths lie in the inheritance of fitness traits. The high scores for fertility, cell count, resistance to mastitis, and longevity have a very positive impact on Guy's fitness score. For all measures, it scores at least one standard deviation above the population mean. This results in a fitness score of 125. With an increase of 852 kg in milk yield and 0.02 % in protein content, he also demonstrates solid performance traits.

His physical characteristics are influenced by his sire, Noro. The cows tend to be somewhat slender in build and have a straight hock angle. Despite the cows being on the slender side, his daughters

calve easily. Because they have inherited slightly longer teats, which are ideal for teat placement, the cows can be milked easily. It is also worth noting the positive breeding value for temperament.

Guy as a genetic developer

Seven bulls at Swissgenetics and one bull at Select Star demonstrate that Guy was a highly regarded sire for genetic development. In fact, Harvey is a son of Guy and currently ranks number one in total net merit.

What is striking is the consistently good genetic makeup of his sons in terms of fitness and conformation. All of them have positive effects on fertility. The excellent

udder traits passed down by his sons are also noteworthy.

The maternal line of the young bulls also plays a role in milk yield. There, the young bulls pass on their traits in different ways. Since Guy carries the BH39 haplotype associated with rearing loss, this trait should be taken into account when selecting a mate.

A strong family of cows

In 2025, Balzac Griotte, Guy's mother, was the top-producing cow in terms of fat and protein yield (in kilograms). With an average yield of 12 609 kg, containing 5.58 % fat and 4.04 % protein, her performance is outstanding and 35 LP above the farm average.

Her mother, Simbaboy Gretchen, produced 13 209 kg of milk with 4.78 % fat and 3.83 % protein during her second lactation, which was 27 LP above the farm average.

However, Guy is not the first son from this cow family to have passed a progeny test. Along with Greg, a son of Eagle out of Jupiter Goyesca also returned to action. Goyesca is a name that has been in the family on my mother's side for seven generations.

With so much good news, we hope everyone enjoys their Brown Swiss and makes wise choices when selecting bulls.

A pioneering breeding program from Graubünden

Schamaun Brown Swiss is a well-known prefix worldwide. With the bull Glenn, the farm set new standards in Brown Swiss breeding. His influence is still clearly evident in many cow families today.

Florian Schamaun took over the farm from his father in 1990. Even as a young farmer, he had many ideas and a clear vision of how he wanted to develop the farm. This foresight was already evident in 1992, when he built one of the first free-stall barns with a milking parlor in the canton of Graubünden. At that time, the farm comprised just over 13 hectares of land, 16 cows, and six head each of heifers and calves.

Cutting-edge advancements

Together with his wife Silvia and their children Melanie, Andrea, and Corina, Florian quickly expanded the farm in a forward-thinking way. In 2016, a new house was built and the old house was renovated,

ensuring that housing arrangements for the next generation were taken care of well in advance. In 2021, the family fulfilled another big dream by building a new, state-of-the-art free-range barn. The new barn is equipped with state-of-the-art technology, including a milking robot and a manure and feeding robot. The farm now covers 64 hectares, of which about 17 percent are farmed as ecological land. In addition, they offer various contract services such as livestock transport and everything related to manure management. In winter, snow removal is also part of the daily routine. Anyone who spends time on the farm will quickly notice how consistently the farm managers' clear vision is put into practice.

Focus on the dairy industry

The fact that the farm is now clearly focused on milk production is also thanks to the next generation. She made a conscious decision to pursue dairy farming, and the farm is set to be handed over in the coming years. Their son Andrea and Jeannine, as well as their daughter Corina and Andreas, will continue to run the business together in the future. While Andrea and Jeannine also run the Tijuana Bar in Davos, both couples are actively involved in the business's ongoing development.

Glenn – The Ancestor of Many Cattle Families

Thanks to Glenn, the Schamaun farm became known worldwide. At first,

however, it didn't look as though this bull would go on to become such a success. Florian, however, had high hopes for him and put him to work as a natural breeding bull. When the first cattle began to show a very strong conformation, Swissgenetics took notice of the bull.

After several cows had already calved, Swissgenetics added the bull to its lineup. The demand was so high that Glenn wasn't available for long.

Pepita as a dairy cow

In addition to Glenn, several very well-known cows have also come from the Schamaun barn. Certainly one of the best known was Som's daughter Pepita. Florian bought Pepita at the 2008 IGBS sale as a bargain lot. She went on to win Agrischa 2012 and achieved many more successes at both the cantonal and national levels. Today, about 75 percent of the animals at Schamaun BS come from this family, thanks in part to the extensive use of embryo transfer.

It is particularly noteworthy that this line produces very high-performing animals with excellent udders. As a result, Pepita's offspring can often be seen in the show ring. Two top breeding lines – scoring 88 and 89 points – from Pepita and her Glenn daughter Gina have already been evaluated.

Moving the animals to the mountain pastures

The Schamauns spend a lot of time in the alpine pastures during the summer. Each year, 20 to 25 cows are brought to the private alp in Dischma to be milked there. The milk is then taken to the farm and sold to mooh from there. Andreas and Annamargreth Ambühl take their dairy cows and all their young cattle to summer pasture. Cows that calved late and are producing a lot of milk remain on the home farm. Alpine grazing is a top priority on the farm.

Health records from the veterinarian

As a Bruna Data-affiliated practice, Schamauns maintains its cow health records entirely digitally. This makes it much easier to keep track of the animals' health. Since last fall, the workload at Schamauns has

been significantly reduced once again. The reason for this is the automatic exchange of health data. The health data entered by the veterinarian in the Diana Cloud veterinary practice management software is automatically transferred to BrunaNet. This ensures that everything is fully documented and clearly presented during

inspections. This makes it easy to quickly check a cow's health history at any time. ■

“You don’t have to come from a farm to become a milk recorder”

When Ursula Renner pulls up in her car, the large picture of two brown cows on the hood immediately catches your eye. And when you talk to her, one thing becomes clear very quickly: Ursi loves cows! She works as a milk recorder for the Unterägeri Livestock Breeders’ Association (VZV). Beat Iten is the president and liaison officer (LO) of the cooperative.

Even as a little girl, Ursi loved sitting next to the kids who came from the farm at school. The smell of the stable and the topics of conversation were a real draw for them. Beat grew up on the farm in Unterägeri. Even as a young boy, he dreamed of serving on the board of the livestock breeders’ association.

Started as a milk recorder

Ursi didn’t grow up on a farm, but she’s always been fascinated by cows. And so it happened that she began helping out at a local dairy farm in her spare time. In 1990, the then-farm manager learned that the livestock cooperative was looking for a

milk recorder. That’s what he told Ursi, and she was immediately hooked. At first, the farmers were skeptical that the slender, petite Ursi would even be able to lift the heavy milk cans and weigh the milk. However, as soon as they realized how resilient Ursi is, their skepticism began to fade.

Structural change is evident

A lot has changed in milk recording over the past 35 years. The barns were converted from tie-stall systems to free-stall systems, the number of cows per farm increased, and the cows are producing more milk.

Unlike in the past, many farms now use the AT4 method for weighing. So just once instead of twice, and no longer using a bucket, but more convenient milk measuring devices. There are also more and more robots.

“Plus, the barns are getting more and more spacious,” Ursi says with a laugh. “More comfort for the cows, a little less for the milk recorder.” However, if it’s for the animal’s well-being, Ursi is more than happy to put on an extra jacket.



Now in its second generation of farm managers

Ursi oversees seven farms. In almost all of these farms, the second generation is now serving as the manager. So she's known the farm managers since they were children. The atmosphere is friendly, and the breeders are happy to answer questions about current topics.

Working with the "most beautiful animal in the world" means a great deal to Ursi. It improves her quality of life, and she needs it. She enjoys working with the other milk recorders at the cooperative, and they help one another.

Goal: Wake up every breeder once

Ursi's goal is to catch every breeder sleeping at least once and have to wake them up. This has worked for almost everyone at some point. This happened regularly in the summer at a farm that practiced alpine farming. But Ursi knew what was going on and had already gotten everything ready in the barn. The breeder had faith in her. One morning, however, the bull was loose in the barn, so Ursi decided to wait for the breeder after all.

What qualifications must a milk recorder have?

According to Ursi, to be a milk recorder, you have to enjoy working with livestock and not be afraid of getting dirty. Plus, you have to get up early. This work can be done by both men and women. And as Ursi's example shows, you don't need a background in agriculture. If you're interested, she recommends accompanying an experienced milk recorder on a visit. That

way, you'll quickly realize whether you enjoy your work.

Beat Iten: President and Liaison Officer of the VZV Unterägeri

Beat Iten has been a member of the VZV Unterägeri board for several years. In 2020, he took on the role of liaison officer, and since 2021, he has also served as president. Now that he has taken on the role of liaison officer, he is responsible for the three milk inspectors at VZG. Beat is fortunate that they work together very well and handle many matters among themselves.

It's quiet at the VZV. Almost all breeders attended the general meeting, and everyone also participated in the anniversary show. The milk recorders have written to the farmers. It was a wonderful experience for everyone involved.

Sharing the joy of Brown Swiss

Beat is eager to share his love for the brown cow with his colleagues. At this year's annual general meeting, he organized a presentation by Braunvieh Schweiz. In addition, the VZV organizes an outing every winter. If he has any questions, Beat can count on Braunvieh Schweiz for help. He also has a lot of information available on BrunaNet.

Beat runs the Oberfuren farm in Unterägeri together with his wife Nadine. They milk 30 purebred Brown Swiss cows and keep a few bulls for breeding. The farm also has a few laying hens, horses, and Bernese Mountain Dogs. Beat and Nadine sell many of their products directly through the farm stand.

Cow Collection

Ursi and Beat have known each other ever since Beat was a little boy. He, too, is part of the second generation that Ursi visits for milk testing. When he was a little boy, Beat used a jigsaw to cut out a wooden cow for Ursi and gave it to her; they both remember it well. This cow was a perfect fit for Ursi's collection. Her entire apartment is decorated with cows. She owns several hundred figurines.

First woman on the board of Braunvieh Schweiz

The Delegates' Assembly of Braunvieh Schweiz was once again held in Baar. That somewhat "magical" date (April 1) marked the first time in history that a woman joined the board of Braunvieh Schweiz. All agenda items were approved unanimously.



Franziska Duss, the first woman to represent the canton of Lucerne, and Alfred Andergg (a breeder of OB cattle and a bull owner) representing the canton of Bern, are welcomed to the board of Braunvieh Schweiz by President Adrian Arnold and Director Martin Rust.

A total of 429 delegates and 85 guests attended the General Assembly. In his opening remarks, Braunvieh President Adrian Arnold described the following situation: "In Switzerland, the attacks on agriculture show no sign of stopping." During the spring session, lawmakers succeeded in passing the Federal Council's proposed austerity package, totaling 259 million to largely avert the burden on farming families in

Parliament. "That amounts to over 5000 francs per farm over many years, because the financing of AP2030 will be based on this figure." He strongly emphasized the importance of strong representation in the next Parliament from 2027–31: "It will be crucial for the shaping of AP2030+ and thus directly for the future of our farms, milk production, and cattle farming in Switzerland." Finally, President Adrian Arnold thanked

all Brown Swiss breeders, all stakeholders, and all employees for their dedication to the well-being of the Brown Swiss cow.

Projects in 2025/2026

All items on the agenda were approved unanimously. The annual financial statements closed with a slight profit. The association continues to stand on a very solid foundation. Director Martin Rust provided an update on current projects.

- Introduction of the single-step method in breeding value estimation
- Attended the BV World Congress in Colombia, where the Presidium was elected and the next World Congress was scheduled to be held, featuring the European Exhibition and BRUNA 2028
- LBE update with important changes to the Frame, Pelvis, Foundation, Udder, and Teats sections
- Controlling / Review of the 2030 Strategy

– 2026 European Congress plus a project on joint breeding value estimation for Brown Swiss in Europe

Naturally, some projects have been and continue to be developed and implemented in collaboration with our closest external partners – swissherdbook, Holstein Switzerland, and Mutterkuh Schweiz – as well as Swissgenetics, Suisselab, and Qualitas.

New Board Members

The canton of Lucerne is gaining a new representative on the board in the form of Franziska Duss from Escholzmatt – notably, the first woman in the 129-year

history of Braunvieh Schweiz. She is replacing Josef Portmann, who, after nearly 12 years on the board – including 10 years on the executive committee – stepped down due to age after serving as a dedicated VS member in a key role. Sepp was a dedicated board member, an active Brown Swiss cattle breeder, and president of both the Lucerne Cantonal Association and the VZG. He has long served as an LBE expert for Braunvieh Schweiz and will resume this role in the fall.

Franziska Duss is a teacher and counselor at the LBBZ Schluechthof in Cham. Among

other things, she served as managing director of Braunvieh Luzern for 10 years and was a member of the IGBS board for many years. Today, she is best known as a dedicated BS breeder and the manager of her own farm in Escholz matt. The agronomist (FH) runs a farm in Mountain Zone 1 with about 25 cows plus heifers.

Christian Zürcher of Trubschachen, a long-standing board member, is also stepping down. The Bernese BS breeder has been a strong advocate for promoting the breed in the canton of Bern, particularly through the annual sales event in Schüpbach. He was an active supplier of Brown Swiss cows there and is still regarded today within the canton of Bern as an active promoter of the Brown Swiss breed.

He is being replaced by Alfred Anderegg from Meiringen, another Original Brown breeder. The master farmer runs a 48-hectare farm with his wife Judith and their four children, including Alp. They currently have 46 dairy cows, plus calves and several bulls. In addition, they keep bees and goats, and the family is involved in forage production, crop farming, alpine farming, forestry, and direct sales

Outstanding achievements and various honors

Deputy Director Andreas Kocher honored the owners of cows with a lifetime milk yield of more than 125 000 kg, respectively 150 000 kg of milk. An impressive 44 cows (4 of which produced more than 150 000 kg) achieved this milk yield. In addition, one prize each was awarded for the "Fitness Star" in the mountain and valley categories.

As a final tribute, long-time employees Martin Romann (Senior Inspector, MLP) and Franziska Rechsteiner (Herd Book Clerk) were honored and bid farewell. At the conclusion of the meeting, Deputy Director Andreas Kocher gave a brief presentation on the new and current breeding goal for 2031. ■

Nozza shines in Cazis

On Saturday, March 28, 2026, the best of the Brown Swiss breeding community gathered at the well-attended Bündner Arena in Cazis for the fourth Brown Swiss Masters. Mäderhof's Phil Gerda and Cadalbert's Pete Nozza went home as the big winners.

The excitement for this year's Brown Swiss Masters was already palpable in the run-up to the event. The fourth edition of the well-known exhibition in Graubünden attracted more animals than ever before. In addition, the organizing committee led by President Matthias Süess held its first-ever sale featuring attractive deals.

Gerda Becomes Junior Champion

The quality of the first-calf heifers was extremely high. So Judge Markus Tischhauser didn't have an easy job in the ring. But one stood out above the rest: Gerda, the daughter of Phil, owned by Kevin and Maya Züger of Vorderthal, Schwyz. In the championship competition, she prevailed over Süess Top Dobry Byk Blanca, owned by Tres Durrer of Kerns, Obwalden, and Klettenhof Biniam Petronella, owned

by Christian Schneider of Schwendi, St. Gallen. The Schöneuter Junior title went to Roffler's Phil Toscana, owned by Thomas Roffler-Flütsch of Grüşch, GR. The runner-up was the Junior Reserve champion Blanca, followed by Rocky Betty, owned by Ezio Pedrini of Airola, TI, in third place.

Auction cows with distinguished pedigrees

Right after the heifers, things moved quickly with the first Masters Sale in Cazis. The first Sarazzin calf in Switzerland was sold under lot number 1: Shorley, owned by Sandro Huser from Necker. Also up for auction were female offspring of well-known cows such as Bays Vanessa, Virestar Nischa, Phil Pinia, and Phil Toscana, who had recently been crowned udder junior champion.

Bearing the number 6, M & M's Cyrus Baila – a daughter of the current European Show Champion Felder's BS Besco Beluah – entered the ring. The animal owned by Matthias and Fränzi Süess of Andwil, St. Gallen, sold for 15 600 francs. The final bid set the day's highest price, serving as the grand finale. Cabalzar's Swizzero Berna, the first daughter of the udder champion at the 2024 European Show in Imst, 2024 Swiss Classic champion, and 2025 IGBS champion, changed hands for 16 000 francs with Renzo's BS Brice Bernice. The average price of all animals sold was 6800 francs.

Nora prevails over her competitors for the udder title

Julius Nora, owned by Walter Rechsteiner of Bächli (Hemberg), SG, went one better after finishing second in the division last

year. As the fourth-place finisher in her division, she was eligible to compete in the udder competition in the medium-sized cow category, where she sensationally claimed victory. Second place went to Bays Vanessa, owned by Jan Beer and Oliver Lehmann from Olivone, Ticino; third place went to G-Wal Brice Lamba, owned by Ueli Tischhauser from Oberschan, St. Gallen.

In the udder class for older cows, the 2022 Swiss Classic champion, Phil Estell owned by Martin Wallimann of Alpnach Dorf, OW, prevailed over the runner-up, Pedrini Top TI Pete Baltika owned by Ueli Tischhauser of Oberschan, SG, and DOLF BS Silverstar Tracy owned by Kevin and Maya Züger of Vorderthal, SZ.

Ticino's Dominance in the Championship

Last year, two cows from Renzo Blumen-thal's herd in Vella, Graubünden – the champion cow NZ's Saas BS Calvin Palmira and the honorable mention Cabalzar's Swizzero Berna – took the podium.

This year, the runner-up from last year's Masters and defending champion at this year's Giubiespo, Cadalbert's Pete Nozza, owned by Matthias and Melanie Vitali of Olivone, TI, took the top spot in the rankings. The beauty described as EX90 (EU 92) in her second lactation prevailed over Phil Estell, the beautiful udder winner among the older cows, and Bays Vanessa, the beautiful udder runner-up among the

Germany: The Best of the Best

Under the motto "The Best of the Best," the German Brown Swiss Show took place at the Breeding and Marketing Center in Unterthingau. For first-calf cows, eligibility required a minimum milk yield of 28 kg and a total merit index of 112, which is roughly one standard deviation above the average. Swiss judge Josef Portmann selected his winners from a total of 115 cows. The Schüpfheim breeder chose as Grand Champion a cow that has also been well-known in Switzerland for the past two years: Wald von Stockingen Dairy, a daughter of Pete, won the udder title for all first-calf cows at the 2024 European Show in Imst. The Reserve Champion is a powerful fifth-calf cow: Tjara, a daughter of Fanfare, owned by Martin and Ines Sichler from Blaichach. The Honorable Mention, also owned by Stockingen Dairy, is Fevi, a daughter of Levi, in her third lactation.

Owen Jamaica offers the complete package

Among the first-calf cows, an Owen daughter took the top spot: Fanta, owned by Stefan Achberger of Scheidegg, won the title ahead of Tina, a Nathan daughter owned by Fuchs GbR, and Jamaika, an Owen daughter owned by Christof Bentele of Grünkraut. With her strong conformation, 34.1 kg of milk yield, and a total merit index of 127, this cow offers a complete package.

The udder title for young cows went to Ilana, a daughter of Rocky, owned by Sauter GbR of Bad Wurzach. She is the half-sister of the breeding bull AG Disco. Among the multiparous cows, one cow stood out with an udder that would rank among the very best internationally: Wolke, a daughter of Bormio, owned by Richard Schindele of Unterthingau.

An average of over 15 000 kg

The national show was rounded out by a class of OB cows and a strong division featuring eight cows with a lifetime milk yield of over 100 000 kg. Right at the front here: Nixe, a daughter of Hebron, owned by Michael Schmaus from Rot an der Rot. This cow also impresses with an average milk yield of 15 143 kg, containing 4.33 % fat and 3.77 % protein. She was surpassed by a cow from the same farm, which also won the Genetics Award with a TMI of 136: Laela, a Dane daughter, has an average milk yield of 16 181 kg with 4.40 % fat and 3.72 % protein. In the young cow category, the Genetics Award went to a cow with outstanding first-lactation performance: Nanika, a daughter of New York from Lindenhof Meyer in Buchloe, has a TMI of 134 and finished her first lactation with 11,823 kg of milk, containing 3.92 % fat and 3.41 % protein. ■

Glarus Breeders Celebrate Their 100th Anniversary

On Holy Saturday, the Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders' Association of Glarus and the Surrounding Area hosted a special celebration. The association was founded a hundred years ago and continues to this day to showcase a wide variety of high-quality Brown Swiss cattle.

The Miss titles went from Netstal to Riedern and on to Glarus, and the audience was also able to contribute their votes.

As early as 7:30 in the morning, when the first families, decked out in their costumes and accompanied by their animals, began to parade down the street, crowds of spectators lined the streets. Farm families arrived from Netstal to Schwändi, captivating the surrounding area with the loud ringing of bells. "With just over 280 animals entered, the turnout is encouragingly high," said Erich Gwerder, president of the Livestock Breeders' Association, with satisfaction. All the animals were tied together on the same rail at each farm, which created a pleasant sense of calm in the exhibition rows.

Special competitions

Among the cows weighing 100 000 grams, the 19-year-old Topboy Edelweis, owned by Ruedi Tschudi-Zweifel from Ennenda, paraded around the ring, while the youngest of the six bulls was just 1½ years old.

The best genetics among the Original Brown cattle came from Arcas Karla, owned by Samuel and Peter Horner of Glarus. In the Brown Swiss category, Brice Joana, owned by Sepp Weber-Giger of Netstal, won the title. The star of the profitability competition was Vital Gina, also from Horners in Glarus.

With a podium entirely filled by cattle from his herd (1st: Amir Analinda, 2nd: Pete Polka, 3rd: Yule Yvonn), the Hans Zehnder-Weber family of Netstal dominated the younger cows' udder competition, while his Lennox Laura also claimed the title for the most beautiful udder in the older cows' category.

yet refined animal that had immediately caught his eye.

Heini Stricker from Mörschwil also served as a judge and selected Hans Zehnder-Weber's Lennox Laura – who had already won the title of "Most Beautiful Cow" among the older Brown Swiss animals – as the most beautiful Brown Swiss cow of the Glarus and Surrounding Areas Cattle Breeders' Association.

"All the farmers who presented animals here deserve a round of applause," said Stricker, expressing his gratitude for the way the diverse livestock had enlivened the show. ■

The Genetics Award went to Caviezel Cloe, owned by Franz Bischof of Fischingen, TG, and Wildhaber's Cadence Carla, owned by Romeo Wildhaber, was once again named the Top Performer.
